FINAL ORDER

Gregory Ford Gilbert was convicted of a serious crime as defined by Rule 83.2(b)(2) of the Rules of the United States Court of Federal Claims (“RCFC”), and judgment was entered on June 7, 2019. *See United States v. G. Ford Gilbert*, Docket No. 18-cr-116 (M.D. Ala.). Mr. Gilbert did not report his conviction to this Court as required by Rule 83.2(e).


Mr. Gilbert has been a member of this Court’s bar since April 22, 1983 and has no pending cases. Under Rule 83.2(c)(1), an attorney admitted to practice before this Court may be disciplined on the grounds of the conviction by another court of a serious crime. Disbarment is the presumed discipline for the conviction by another court of a serious crime. RCFC 83.2(g)(7)(A). Mr. Gilbert also failed to notify this Court of his conviction, which is a violation of Rule 83.2(e)(1)(A) and additional grounds for discipline under Rule 83.2(c)(4).

On December 6, 2019, the Court issued an order directing Mr. Gilbert to show cause within 30 days why he should not be disbarred from practice before the United States Court of Federal Claims. ECF No. 2. The Order to Show Cause further stated that if no response was received, Mr. Gilbert would be permanently disbarred from practice before the Court. *Id.* To date, Mr. Gilbert has not responded to the Order to Show Cause. Therefore,

IT IS ORDERED that Gregory Ford Gilbert shall be permanently disbarred from the practice of law before the United States Court of Federal Claims, effective, *nunc pro tunc*, June 7, 2019, the date judgment entered on his criminal conviction. The filing of any petition for reinstatement will be governed by RCFC 83.2(k)(1).
